

**Types of attachment: match up the correct statements to the attachment heading.**

**Insecure disorganised**

(ANXIOUS) children tend to avoid social interaction and intimacy with others. Does not show a response to separation. Does not seek proximity on the return of caregiver

**Insecure attachment**

Comfortable with social interaction and intimacy. Uses the caregiver as a safe base from which to explore.

**Insecure – resistant  
Ambivalent) (**

Lack of consistent patterns of social behaviour, therefore the child lacks a coherent strategy for dealing with the stress of separation.

**SECURELY ATTACHED**

This is a form of attachment that results from a lack of responsiveness from the caregiver to the infants needs. Also associated with poor cognitive and emotional development.

**INSECURE AVOIDANT**

The distress shown by an infant when approached or picked up by someone who is unfamiliar.

**Stranger anxiety**

Infants seek and reject intimacy and social interaction.  
  
On separation there is an immediate and intense display of distress. On reunion, they may angrily resist being picked up, whilst still seeking proximity.

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
